

How to Run for State Office

The first step in running for state office is to understand the duties of that office. The responsibilities and duties for each office are listed in Article IV of the current bylaws and the policy and procedure manual along with a brief description below. IF you have questions concerning the duties and responsibilities of a specific office, please feel free to contact that officer. The officers' Names, addresses, and phone numbers are listed in the front of the guidebook. They are willing and eager to answer your questions.

Another step is to attend as many KANS and NSNA sponsored events as possible. This will help by the board, and prepares reports of the total assets and

you to understand the obligations of a board member and how KANS operates on a larger national scale. Possible evens including KANS Spring Summit, K-COSP, KANS State Convention, KANS State Board Meetings, NSNA Mid-Year Convention, NSNA National Convention, and any other similar events

You may run for more than one office,, but you can only accept and hold one office. The first office you are elected to must be accepted at that time.

<u>President</u>: Presides at all Executive Board Meetings, acts as a representative for the association, appoints special committees, represents the organization to NSNA, and oversees all aspects of the association.

Vice President Parliamentary:

Assumes responsibility in the president's absence and is Chairperson of the bylaws committee.

<u>Vice President Convention</u>: In charge of planning and implementing the state convention in conjunction with KSNA, and is responsible for the convention program. She/he is the chairperson of the convention committee.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Acts as a custodian of organization funds, makes payments with the approval of the President and as authorized

expenditures. She/he is the Chairperson of the budget committee.

Secretary: Conducts general correspondence of the association, notifies all constituent associations of KANS meetings, keeps record of all correspondence, records and distributes minutes, keep files of reports, and documents, and keeps register of all member schools.

<u>Projects Chair</u>: Facilitates KANS projects, statewide health projects, and fundraising activities. She/he is the

Chairperson for the projects committee.

Legislative Chair: Sends out legislative alerts, monitors state and local legislation, maintains communication with NSNA regarding state and national legislative activities and represents KANS to KSNA. She/he is the Chairperson for the resolutions committee.

Newsletter Editor/Historian:

Edits, writes, solicits advertising, and oversees printing and distribution of the KANS Newsletter, the official publication of KANS.

Membership Chair: Carries out theories of Breakthrough to Nursing, initiates contact with prospective member schools and maintains contact with active members.

Nominations and Elections
Committee chair: Be responsible for the slating and verifying eligibility of candidates for the annual meeting of KANS at the State Convention in October

Breakthrough to Nursing Chair:

Gather and maintain updated information about nursing schools in the state and focus projects on recruitment/retention efforts state wide.

Bylaw Changes

Hello fellow nursing students! Your KANS board wishes all positive vibes as we continue our journeys to become nurses! With the upcoming convention we have made the decision to update some of the bylaws passed. We would greatly appreciate any ideas or suggestions based on the following.

Last fall a bylaw change in article IV section III was made which changed the length of terms for officers. To do this we would need to vote to amend last year's bylaw change back to twelve-month terms then vote to add the option of

volunteering from the first elected month to six months after the new board is elected. Only the new board will have voting power, and those who volunteer for six months will be required to keep in contact by telephone or email if needed. It was originally changed to 18-month terms, with the stipulation that six months be given to help guide the new board.

We also made sure to add that if called upon it must be prior to the slated business meeting. We decided as a whole that as students and newly graduating nurses upholding a mandatory six-month agreement may make running for a state office unattainable.



We want to make becoming a member of the KANS board attainable for all. We understand that we are student nurses and time is valuable. Our united goal is to aid in the development of the professional nurse with the ability to provide outstanding care for all people. 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My Experience at Mayo Clinic

My Mayo experience starts long before my first day on the floor, before the acceptance letter, and before my application. I heard about the Mayo Clinic Externship while I was attending the KANS convention in October of 2014. I saw the booth and decided to give it a shot. With a little encouragement from a teacher, I approached and began a lengthy conversation. I continued to proceed with the convention and was elected treasurer. Two weeks later I went to Portland Oregon for the semiannual convention and again I met the Mayo Clinic recruiter, shook his hand and handed him my business card. January came and with my time off, I spent over what seems to be months plotting and dissecting my application. I sent my application in two days before the deadline and my stomach hit the floor with anticipation. School started and I forgot about the application. One day in March I was talking to one of my peers about how this chance could change my life forever. Not five minutes later I received an email saying that I have not been accepted and thanking me for my time. Disappointed, I knew it was a long shot and thought at least I gave it a shot. It was on a Friday and I was going home to do some self-care. Less than ten minutes later I received a call from Rochester, MN. I assumed that wanted to thank me for applying

to the program and encouraging me to strive for greatness. I answer my phone and received the greatest news possible. There was a glitch in the system and I had actually been accepted in to the Mayo Clinic Externship. I went from the low poor me, to a super high with in fifteen minutes. Two months later I was in Rochester, looking at the Mayo Clinic and having to pinch myself to make sure it wasn't a dream. The first couple of days were education, greetings and getting lost. Day three came with us hitting the floor and working with patients. As if that wasn't bad enough that I don't know where anything is, I haven't met or heard about my preceptor(s). I was greeted with a smile and short and brief explanation and description of what I can and cannot do. Next thing I know, I was standing in hand off being asked questions and waiting for my input for the patients that we were receiving. This day seemed to be a blur as I met even more people and got in interact with patients that I had no idea of how to plan their care. Progressive Care Unit (PCU)/ Vascular Step Down, my thought were what does this mean, what kind of patients will I be taking care of and what did I remember from class that will help me show that I'm not completely stupid. The day before I went into the clinical experience, one of the summer three coordinators stated that all the books that we brought with this summer need to disappear. She was more interested in are ability to be human and show that we have



leadership skills. Between my preceptor thoughts and my ideas, of what was going to be expected of me, I found a rhythm. It was not my preceptors or managers way, but my own. The summer was met with all types of emotion and I loved to say that I learned so much about nursing I felt completely comfortable by the end of the summer. While I was there I was able to observe three other areas for one day. Including Cath lab, open heart CABG with a four vein bypass, and Cardiac surgical ICU (which was my favorite). The summer could not have been so great without the people around you and I don't mean my preceptors. I'm talking about the people that I lived with. These were the three greatest guys. We came from all over including Puerto Rico, Pennsylvania, and Missouri. At first the only thing that we had in common was nursing and that's what got us started to getting to know each other. After that we went from dorm to dorm, getting to know each other and learning about their experiences. That summer gave me the confidence to feel comfortable with myself and learn so much. It was one of the greatest summers ever.
